

Sixties Scoop Class Action Lawsuit

Between 1965 and 1984, thousands of Indigenous children were removed from their homes and placed with non-Indigenous families. Those affected lost all contact with their children, families and siblings. They also lost critical connection to their language, culture and identity.

A class action lawsuit was launched with the intent to compensate those affected by this period called the Sixties Scoop.

Peel CAS and the child welfare sector are actively working with local Indigenous communities and organizations to reconcile with the affected First Nations, Metis, and Inuit families and individuals.

Are you a survivor of the Sixties' Scoop?

If you were a service recipient during this period, you may be eligible for compensation.
